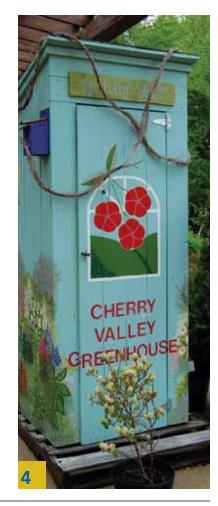
Upcycled signs 2. help customers find the perfect veggies after they **3.** direct them to the edibles area.

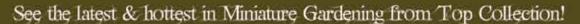
3. The "potty" shed is a conversation piece, while the restrooms are indoors just steps away.





















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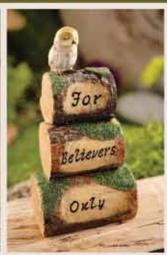
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1. These pots at Sawyer Garden Center in Sawyer are ready for your customers to mix and match with any outdoor color palette. And they look fun on your benches!

- **7.** This structure takes up room, but the area both sells sheds and adds display space.

















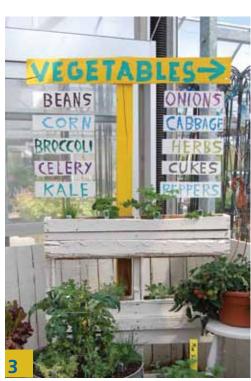
